FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

January is often the exact opposite of December. In December Christmas keeps us busy, too busy. We hustle from store to store looking for the perfect gift. Friends and family stop by and visit or we make the trip to do the same. The gatherings and parties seem to come one right after another. And then it is January. For awhile we're content with the slower pace of life. We're glad to have our house back and fewer social gatherings. But it doesn't take long for contentment to change to restlessness. The cold January days keep us inside and many people exchange their December busyness for January loneliness.

So what can you do if you have a case of the winter blues? First of all you can express your feelings honestly. It's okay to battle loneliness. We all do sometimes, though many refuse to admit it. By expressing your feelings I mean to start with God. He can handle it. He knows your heart anyway. Confess to Him in prayer that you are lonely and need help. Jesus cried on the cross, "My God, My God, Why have you forsaken Me?" He felt the sting of loneliness in a way that we can't imagine, but He wasn't afraid to express those feelings to His Father.

Secondly, you can examine God's promises. Times of loneliness are wonderful opportunities to search the Scriptures and rest in the promises of God. While you might feel alone, you'll find that God has promised His eternal presence in the life of His children. While you may feel forsaken, God has promised never to leave you nor forsake you. The truth is we often allow our feelings to override the facts. I'm not ignoring your feelings of loneliness. I'm simply suggesting that when we rightly understand the promises of God, we'll conclude that we do have a "friend who sticks closer than a brother."

Third, you can expect God's provisions. Once you understand the promises of God you can expect that God will provide exactly what you need. Notice I did not say what you want. There is often a world of difference. Expressing our feelings to God should come with the understanding that He not only knows our thoughts but desires to heal our wounds. If that means we need a friend, He can certainly provide. As I look through Scripture I realize that David had his Jonathan, Moses had his Joshua, Elijah had Elisha, and Paul had Timothy, Barnabas, Silas, and a host of others from time to time. God has designed us to need companionship. At the same time the Bible says that those who want friends must themselves be friendly.

Finally, explore helping others. I know of no better cure for the winter blues, or loneliness, than to fix our eyes on someone other than ourselves. Volunteer at church. Help out at a local ministry, perhaps one of our two Baptist Centers or Camp. Or just go next door and visit with an elderly widow for an hour. The opportunities are endless but with each one you'll find that you can brighten someone else's day and help cure your loneliness at the same time.


